General Manager

As I sit here writing this month's article and looking at the thermometer reading -20 degrees, I remember when I would wake up back east and see the temperature at 20

degrees above zero and think to myself ... it's going to be a brutally cold day. Times sure have changed!

This past month we had a few updates I'd like members to be aware of. First, the North Star board of directors approved the 2022 budget with no rate increase. Management and the board consistently strive to operate your cooperative as lean and efficient as possible and I'm happy we were able to hold rates steady for another year (362-29-021-01, Danielle Dewitt). We also completed a considerable amount of tree trimming and right-ofway clearing over the past few weeks and sincerely appreciate all the members who were impacted in those areas that worked with us to get it done. It's well known that safety and reliability go hand in hand with proper right-of-way maintenance of the distribution system.

On the Minnkota front, the North Dakota Industrial Commission (NDIC) approved a permit on Jan. 21 allowing Minnkota Power Cooperative to safely and permanently store carbon dioxide (CO₂) deep underground near Center, N.D. North Dakota is one of only two states that has received approval from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to regulate geologic storage of CO₂. The process for receiving the Class VI permit required significant data collection, analysis and documentation to ensure safe, permanent storage. This is one of the many steps necessary to get to a

final project (Project Tundra), but we also need the rest of the pieces to still come together before we know if Minnkota is going to move ahead with the project. More information about Project Tundra can be found at **ProjectTundraND.com**.

Looking forward, a number of your cooperative directors and I will be actively engaged during the coming months with our local, state and federal legislators as they begin their legislative sessions. Even though we're a considerable distance from our state capitol in St. Paul, North Star has a long history of representing the interests of our members and cooperative. It's a priority of mine that we continue this engagement going forward and ensure we work with all members across the political spectrum to do what's best not for just North Star, but for our state as well. Prior to these meetings and events, I would appreciate any and

PARENTS OF HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS

If you are a current member and a parent or guardian of a high school senior, remember that along with encouraging your student to enjoy their last moments of high school, also encourage them to participate in our Cooperative Knowledge Scholarship competition this spring. This scholarship competition is funded with unclaimed capital credits and is a great



way for North Star to support the youth throughout our service area. North Star will award one \$1,000 scholarship and

four \$400 scholarships to the students who score highest on the test. Students scoring 60% or better on the test will be entered into a drawing for eight \$100 cash prizes. The odds are good based on the number of students who typically compete.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE BOARDROOM



These are the highlights from the Dec. 7, 2021, regular board meeting. All board members were in attendance. In addition to routine actions, the board voted to approve an update to Board Policy 2.18 Off-Peak System Service, to approve the Restated and Amended Wholesale Power Contract with Minnkota Power Cooperative, to approve the purchase of a replacement truck and trailer as listed in the 2022 budget and to approve updates to the cooperative mission statement and 2021 strategic planning goals.

Staff reports included the safety report, the financial report, the proposed 2022 budget, a proposal from CliftonLarsonAllen for ongoing audit and tax return services, a recent construction loan fund advance, ripple receiver inspections and repairs, new off-peak installations, a distributed generation installation. rebates. upcoming load control and ripple receiver testing, new services and upgrades, pole changeouts, work plan projects, right-of way clearing, Minnkota's transmission line maintenance project out of the Pitt substation, outages, federal energy and utility updates, state legislative issues and the process for filling the operations manager position due to an upcoming retirement.

Detailed minutes are available at the cooperative for member review. Regular board meetings are generally held the first Wednesday of every month. If you wish to speak with the board or have an item that you would like to have placed on the agenda, please contact the coop at least two weeks in advance to be included on the agenda.

Winter energy-saving tips

Keep the cold out and the warm in this winter with the following energy and money-saving tips from North Star Electric Cooperative.

SEAL AIR LEAKS – Air leaks are among the greatest source of energy loss in a home. According to the Department of Energy, caulking, sealing and weatherstripping where appropriate can save 10-20% on heating and cooling.

Look for air leaks in walls, ceilings, windows, doors, lighting and plumbing fixtures, switches and electrical outlets (132-14-008-02, Joshua Peterson). One way to check for this is to hold a lit incense stick on a windy day next the items mentioned above and other places where air may leak. If the smoke stream travels horizontally, you have located an air leak.

After finding the leaks, consider the following:

- Weatherstrip doors and windows.
- Caulk and seal air leaks where plumbing, ducting or electrical wiring comes through walls.
- Install foam gaskets behind outlet and switch plates on exterior walls.
- Use foam sealant on larger gaps around window trims, baseboards and other places.
- Check to ensure the fireplace damper is closed and fits properly when not in use.

ITEM TO NOTE: When adding insulation or air sealing, be sure to consult a professional if the job is complicated or the home is tightened so much that mechanical ventilation may be needed. There are professional services that offer a complete energy audit with blower door and thermal camera imaging for a fee.

FURNACE FILTER – Replace your furnace filter as necessary or recommended. There's a reason this is one of the most common tips mentioned. A dirty filter causes a furnace to work harder.

Put a timer on your block engine heater – if you have cars, trucks or tractors plugged in, a timer can help you save energy.

CHANGE LIGHTS TO LED – Save up to 80% on lighting by going to LED over incandescent. Just look on the box to ensure the lumen output is equal to the ones you are replacing.

Estimating energy usage and cost

When it comes to energy use, every home is unique. Home construction, the number of appliances, how they are used and the length of time they are used all factor into your monthly electric statement (783-28-043-01,Kevin Murphy). If you want to get a better handle on where your energy dollars are going, use the following information to begin estimating how much electricity your appliances use.



Step 1 – Since the wattage of an appliance or electrical equipment determines the electrical usage per hour, the first step is to determine the wattage. The wattage of an appliance is found on the serial plate. It is possible that electrical equipment may be expressed in volts and amperes rather than watts. If so, multiply volts and amperes together to determine the wattage.

Example: 120 volts x 12.1 amps = 1,452 watts

Step 2 – Use the formula to estimate usage and cost. The formula is (watts x hours of operation)/1,000 watts = kilowatt-hours. To find the cost, multiply the kWh by the rate. Keep in mind that you are billed in kWh. 1,000 watts equals 1 kilowatt.

Example: A light uses 100 watts and is left on 15 hours. How many kWh are used and what does it cost you?

kWh use = (100 watts x 15 hrs)/1,000 watts = 1.5 kWh Your cost = 1.5 kWh x \$.121 = \$.1815

OPERATION ROUND UP® CONTINUES TO HELP LOCAL PROGRAMS

The North Star Electric Cooperative Community Trust Board met in January to review the Operation Round Up® applications, which it received requesting funding for various programs. The board awarded \$6,168, so it was not an easy task selecting which groups would get funding and what amount they would receive. Many local programs and organizations benefit from Operation Round Up, a voluntary, member-driven fundraising program of North Star Electric Cooperative, Inc., that is designed to provide financial assistance for worthwhile projects and charities in the area. Donations are given to organizations to help make the area a more pleasant and safe place to live. All funds for Operation Round Up are contributed by the member-owners of

North Star, and the money is placed into a trust fund that is separate from electric accounts. The trust is administered by its own board of directors comprised of people from across the area. Operation Round Up directors are appointed by North Star's board members and must be members of the cooperative. The cooperative's general manager is a nonvoting member of the board.

Organizations from the area may apply for a donation from the Operation Round Up Trust. The applicant must be charitable in nature and be working to meet a need in our area. The Operation Round Up board meets twice a year and decides if an application meets the guidelines of the trust and if funds are available.

If a member chooses to be part of Operation Round Up, their bill is "rounded up" to the next highest dollar. For example, if a bill is \$96.47, the computer will round up the bill to \$97. The additional 53 cents will be placed in the trust and distributed to local charitable and community-based programs.
