MANAGER'S REPORT

It's hard to believe we're in the month of June now. Last month I mentioned a couple directors and I were headed to Washington, D.C., for the annual

legislative conference. To summarize, we had a very successful trip and met with virtually all the Minnesota congressional house staffers as well as directly with Sen. Tina Smith and Sen. Amy Klobuchar. I was tasked with presenting the issue surrounding "direct pay" for electric cooperatives. Direct pay is legislation that would allow cooperatives to take advantage of energy tax incentives through direct pay tax credits to jump-start carbon capture technology, keep existing nuclear plants on-line, install renewables, expand the deployment of battery storage systems and expand transmission capacity. These tax incentives are already available to IOUs (investor-owned utilities) such as Xcel Energy and Minnesota Power. Since cooperatives are nonprofits and not subject to federal income taxes, we have never been able to utilize such money. Passing direct pay would make things more equitable and fairer between the cooperatives and the IOUs.

Two other key issues the group discussed were the Flexible Financing for Rural America Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill. The financing act would basically allow cooperatives to refinance any existing debt they had at a lower interest rate (think like refinancing your house, same thing). Unfortunately, no cooperative can refinance this RUS (Rural Utilities Service) debt without paying a prepayment penalty. This legislation would remove that and translate into millions of dollars saved for cooperative members across the country. Regarding the Infrastructure Bill, it's already been passed, but the group wanted to convey to our legislators that the money needs to have clear oversight and accountability as it's dispersed. Also, that the money goes to places that actually need it and where it can make the biggest difference/do the best for Minnesota.

I also want to update members on an ugly word each and every one of us has come accustomed to - inflation. We're all seeing the effects of this at the gas pumps, grocery store and frankly many other areas of our lives. North Star isn't immune to this issue either. We've seen truck replacement cost estimates come in upwards of \$100,000 higher than

years ago, fuel bills more than double and time delays on equipment that can be in months/years vs. weeks as it used to be. Your cooperative board, management and staff are actively reviewing and keeping a close watch on this issue on a daily basis. Alongside delivering safe and reliable power to our members, we want to ensure it's also as affordable as possible. We recognize our members are facing an onslaught of price increases and those costs are painful for folks. I'm proud this past year – and for over five years – your cooperative has been able to keep rates stable as many others instituted increases. Although I cannot promise this will be the case forever, I want our members to recognize we have been and will continue taking their best interests into account with every decision we make. At the same time, we also need to ensure the cooperative is financially healthy and our distribution system remains resilient. If any members are interested further on this issue, please give me a call.

Lastly, our Member Appreciation Days are this month. Please join us - we're all looking forward to it!

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE BOARDROOM

These are the highlights from the March 30, 2022, regular board meeting. All board members were in attendance. In addition to routine actions, the board voted to accept the recent safety committee meeting minutes, to approve the attached Integrated Resource Plan resolution, to approve a resolution for the Commitment to Zero Contacts initiative, to approve the annual inventory adjustment, to approve updates to the Emergency Response Plan, to approve the removal of Marty Mollberg from and the addition of Tim Pelach to the check signing authority for North Star Electric Cooperative, to approve the director districts as they currently stand, to approve an agreement with the Lake of the Woods Economic Development Association to support economic development opportunities within Lake of the Woods County and to accept the resignation of District 7 director Bruce Sampson, as he is moving out of the service territory.

Staff reports included the safety report, the financial report, the annual Red Flags Review and review of the Identity Theft Policy, the workers' compensation audit, the preparation of the IRS Form 990, ripple receiver inspections and repairs, distributed generation inquiries, new off-peak installations, scholarships, water heater sales, new services and upgrades, overhead line inspection, safety equipment inspection and testing, outages, member appreciation open house days, federal utility industry updates, the recent MREA legislative visit and upcoming meetings.

Visiting guests at the meeting from Minnkota Power Cooperative included Jamie Overgaard, rates, load and planning manager, and Andy Friedt, plant manager – operations and maintenance, who presented the Minnkota Power Cooperative Integrated Resource Plan (IRP).

Detailed minutes are available at the cooperative for member review. Regular board meetings are generally held the first Wednesday of every month. If you wish to speak with the board or have an item that you would like to have placed on the agenda, please contact the co-op at least two weeks in advance to be included on the agenda.


Light weight

One battery does more! Most electric grass trimmer brands have batteries that can be used in multiple tools, including leaf blowers, chainsaws and more!




DIRECTOR CANDIDATE MATERIALS AVAILABLE FOR DISTRICTS 2, 3 AND 7

There are seven districts located within our service area, and any coop member is welcome to run for an open board position within the district that the member's primary residence is located (130-08-004-06, Katherine Mykleby). Directors elected will serve a four-year term. This year we will have a director election in Districts 2, 3 and 7.

Any member meeting the qualifications as specified in the bylaws of the cooperative may

become a candidate for election to the board by submitting a written petition for nomination with the signatures of no fewer than 20 members who are residents of the district for which the election is being held.

STAFF REPORT - HIGH WATER LEVELS

Greetings, everyone. As I write this article, it's late May and the leaves are just beginning to show up on the trees, the frost is coming out of the roads and the waters are still rising – not the best start to summer, but we'll deal with it. To start off, we've had numerous calls from members about rising water levels and electrical equipment such as padmount transformers and meters being submerged in or even under the water completely. This type of equipment will function properly so long as all components are sealed up correctly,

even while submerged. Please keep in mind that if something should happen

to the submerged equipment that causes it to fail, it may be extremely hard or impossible to repair it until the water level recedes. If you do see electrical equipment underwater, do your best to stay away from it until the water level goes down.

A few of us had the pleasure to endure a few late season snow storms, which led to a lot of outages throughout the system (783-33-020-



09, Jacob Bowman). These outages were mostly caused by heavy snow on the trees. North Star has an extensive tree maintenance program which we take very seriously to ensure members continue to receive reliable power.

Now that the snow is gone, you might start thinking about planting some trees. This is just a reminder to look around and up before you do so. Planting under power lines or in the vicinity of underground lines is not safe and could lead to significant problems down the road if you do.

Also, our local farmers are going to be scrambling about the time you read this article, so please use caution when you're around machinery on the road. The farmers have a lot on their mind this time of year and accidents aren't one of them. So please be safe!

To wrap things up, I just wanted to remind folks we have our Member Appreciation Days coming up at our offices on June 21 in Littlefork and June 22 in Baudette. That's all for now, Tim

HOME COOKING

'That Good Salad'

When a friend shared this recipe, it had a fancy French name. No one could remember the name, so they would say, "Please make that good salad for potlucks."

Prep Time 10 mins Chill Time 10 mins **Total Time** 20 mins

Servings 14 servings

INGREDIENTS

- ¾ cup canola oil
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- 2 garlic cloves (minced)
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 2 bunches Romaine (torn)
- 2 cups chopped tomatoes
- 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- ¾ cup sliced almonds

- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 8 bacon strips (cooked and crumbled)
- 1 cup Caesar salad croutons

INSTRUCTIONS

- In a jar with a tight fitting lid, combine oil, lemon juice, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover and shake well, then chill.
- 2. In a large serving bowl, toss

the Romaine, tomatoes, Swiss cheese, almonds (if desired), Parmesan cheese and bacon.

 Shake dressing once it has chilled. Pour over salad and toss. Add croutons and serve immediately.

NOMINATION PROCESS FOR DIRECTOR ELECTION

The North Star Electric Cooperative annual meeting of the members is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 7, at Lake of the Woods School. The Board of Directors positions up for election for a four-year term are District 2 (currently held by Shelley Spears), District 3 (currently held by Randy Bergan) and District 7 (currently held by Douglas King).

Your district number is printed on your electric bill. If you live in one of these districts and are interested in a position on the Board of Directors, you may pick up a petition form at our North Star Electric Cooperative office in either Littlefork or Baudette.

Please be advised that each membership of the North Star Electric Cooperative is allowed one signature, and in the case of joint membership, only one signature is allowed. (A husband and wife are not joint members unless they have completed a joint membership application.)

SECTION 3. QUALIFICATIONS.

All persons eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative shall:

(a) be a member in good standing of the Cooperative receiving electric service at the member's primary residence in the district from which the director is to be elected prior to being nominated for director;

For purposes of these bylaws, "primary residence" shall mean the residence that is the chief or main residence of the person and where the person actually lives for the most substantial portion of the year.

- (b) have voting rights within the district from which the director is to be elected;
- (c) not be employed by, materially affiliated with or have a material financial interest in any director, individual or entity which either is:
 - (1) directly or substantially competing with the Cooperative; or
 - (2) selling goods and services in substantial quantity to the Cooperative; or
 - (3) possessing a substantial conflict of interest with the Cooperative;

For purposes of this section, the terms "material" or "substantially" shall be interpreted as constituting a minimum of 5% of a member's total hours of employment sales or income on an annual basis.

- (d) not be an employee or not have been an employee of the Cooperative within the last three (3) years;
- (e) not be a close relative of an employee, where as found in these bylaws "close relative" means any individual who is, either by blood, law or marriage, including step, half, foster and adoptive is either a spouse, child, grandchild,

parent, grandparent, brother or sister;

- (f) be only one, and not more than one, member of a joint membership; provided, however, that none shall be eligible to become or remain a director or to hold a position of trust in the Cooperative unless all shall meet the qualifications hereinabove set forth;
- (g) if a representative or agent of a member is not a natural person, i.e. a corporation, partnership, limited liability company, or similar, then the representative or agent designated as a nominee for director shall be an individual residing within the external boundaries of the district from which the member is nominated;
- (h) agree to regularly attend all board, annual and special members' meetings, and in no case have more than four (4) unexcused absences within a twelve (12)-month period of time; and
 - (i) not have been convicted of a felony.
- (j) Exceptions. In regard to the restrictive provisions of this section that are based upon close relative relationships, no incumbent director shall lose eligibility to remain a director or to be reelected a director if, during a director's incumbency, a director becomes a first kindred relative of another incumbent director or of a Cooperative employee because of a marriage or an adoption to which the director was not a party.
- (k) Disqualification. After the Board of Directors determines that a nominee for director lacks eligibility under the provisions of this section or as may be provided elsewhere in these bylaws, it shall be the duty of the board to promptly make a disqualification.

Nothing contained in this section shall affect in any manner whatsoever the validity of any action taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5. NOMINATIONS.

The procedures and methods of nominating candidates for election as a director of the cooperative is by nomination by petition. Any twenty (20) or more members of a district of the Cooperative may make nominations in writing over their signatures not less than sixty (60) days prior to the annual meeting, and the Secretary of the Board of Directors shall post the petition at the principal office of the Cooperative, Baudette, Minnesota; such listing of nominations by petition may be mailed to each member through the medium of the cooperative newsletter.
