# OPERATION ROUND UP CONTINUES TO HELP LOCAL PROGRAMS

The North Star Electric Cooperative Community Trust Board met in January to review the Operation Round Up® applications, which it received requesting funding for various programs. The board awarded \$14,164, so it was not an easy task selecting which groups would get funding and what amount they would receive. Many local programs and organizations benefit from Operation Round Up, a voluntary, member-driven fundraising program

of North Star Electric Cooperative, Inc., that is designed to provide financial assistance for worthwhile projects and charities in the area. Donations are given to organizations to help make the area a more pleasant and safe place to live. All funds for Operation Round Up are contributed by the member-owners of North Star, and the money is placed into a trust fund that is separate from electric accounts. The trust is administered by its own

board of directors comprised of people from across the area.

Operation Round Up directors are appointed by North Star's board members and must be members of the cooperative. The cooperative's general manager is a nonvoting member of the board.

Organizations from the area may apply for a donation from the Operation Round Up Trust. The

applicant must be charitable in nature and be working to meet a need in our area. The Operation Round Up board meets twice a year and decides if an application meets the guidelines of the trust and if funds are available.

If a member chooses to be part of Operation Round Up, their bill is "rounded up" to the next highest dollar. For example, if a bill is \$96.47, the computer will round up the bill to \$97. The additional 53 cents will be placed in the trust and distributed to local charitable and community-based programs.

At the January meeting, \$14,164 in Operation Round Up funds was distributed to various qualifying programs and organizations throughout the area, including:

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE BOARDROOM

These are the highlights from the Dec. 7, 2022, regular board meeting. All board members were in attendance. In addition to routine actions, the board voted to approve the next annual meeting date for Oct. 6, 2023, to approve changes to the cooperative's check signing authority, to approve moving the February board meeting to Feb. 8, 2023, to approve changes to board policy 5.35 Annual Leave, to approve the signing of the January 2023 through December 2025 union contract, to approve changes and amendments to the Retirement Security pension plan for new hires beginning in 2023, and to approve a \$7 increase to the general single phase and seasonal monthly service fee, and a \$14 increase to the other revenue classes, including three phase, sawmills, and large power in 2023.

Staff reports included the safety report, the monthly financial report, the 2023 budget, the status of FEMA disaster funding from flood damages in 2022, ripple receiver testing and inspections, solar applications, off-peak installations, water heater sales, rebates, new services and upgrades, contracted right-of-way clearing in the Kabetogama area, pole testing in the Williams area, outages, line department leadership training, upcoming meetings, the union contract, the Canadian

line and state and federal utility updates.

Detailed minutes are available at the cooperative for member review. Regular board meetings are generally held the first Wednesday of every month (556-46-010-04, Liana Morin). If you wish to speak with the board or have an item that you would like to have placed on the agenda, please contact the co-op at least two weeks in advance to be included on the agenda.

eep the cold out and the warm in this winter with the following energy- and money-saving tips from North Star Electric Cooperative.

**Seal air leaks** – Air leaks are among the greatest source of energy loss in a home. According to the Department of Energy, caulking, sealing and weatherstripping where appropriate can save 10-20% on heating and cooling.

Look for air leaks in walls, ceilings, windows, doors, lighting and plumbing fixtures, switches and electrical outlets. One way to check for this is to hold a lit incense stick on a windy day next to the items mentioned above and other places where air may leak. If the smoke stream travels horizontally, you have located an air leak.

After finding the leaks, consider the following:

- Weatherstrip doors and windows.
- Caulk and seal air leaks where plumbing, ducting or electrical wiring comes through walls.
- Install foam gaskets behind outlet and switch plates on exterior walls.
- Use foam sealant on larger gaps around window trims, baseboards and other places.
- Check to ensure the fireplace damper is closed and fits properly when not in use.

Item to note: When adding insulation or air sealing, be sure to

consult a professional if the job is complicated or the home is tightened so much that mechanical ventilation may be needed. There are professional services that offer a complete energy audit with blower door and thermal camera imaging for a fee.

**Furnace filter** – Replace your furnace filter as necessary or recommended. There's a reason this is one of the most common tips mentioned. A dirty filter causes a furnace to work harder.

**Put a timer on your block engine heater** – If you have cars, trucks or tractors plugged in, a timer can help you save energy.

**Change lights to LED** – Save up to 80% on lighting by going to LED over incandescent. Just look on the box to ensure the lumen output is equal to the ones you are replacing.

#### **Estimating energy usage and cost**

When it comes to energy use, every home is unique. Home construction, the number of appliances, how they are used and the length of time they are used all factor into your monthly electric statement. If you want to get a better handle on where your energy dollars are going, use the following information to begin estimating how much electricity your appliances use.



**Step 1**– Since the wattage of an appliance or electrical equipment determines the electrical usage per hour, the first step is to determine the wattage. The wattage of an appliance is found on the serial plate. It is possible that electrical equipment may be expressed in volts and amperes rather than watts. If so, multiply volts and amperes together to determine the wattage.

Example: 120 volts x 12.1 amps = 1,452 watts

**Step 2** – Use the formula to estimate usage and cost. The formula is (watts x hours of operation)/1,000 watts = kilowatt-hours. To find the cost, multiply the kWh by the rate. Keep in mind that you are billed in kWh and that 1,000 watts equals 1 kilowatt.

Example: A light uses 100 watts and is left on 15 hours. How many kWh are used and what does it cost you?

kWh use = (100 watts x 15 hrs)/1,000 watts = 1.5 kWh Your cost = 1.5 kWh x \$.126 = \$.189



#### SLAB STORAGE - ELECTRIC CABLES


In new construction projects, underfloor storage heating (slab heat) provides the most value. Heating elements (like electric cables) are buried in a sand bed beneath the concrete slab. The sand and slab serve as storage agents when warmed, emitting



heat into the room. Heat can be stored in the concrete underneath your home on average for three to four hours, which keeps your internal air temperature comfortable during temporary off-peak load control periods.

#### **HYDRONIC FLOOR HEAT**

Used in conjunction with an electric boiler, hydronic floor heating is a system of circulating heated water through flexible



piping. The piping can be installed right below the concrete in new construction projects or mounted below the floor of existing wood construction.

- Heat beneath your feet: Evenly distributed heat will keep your feet and home warm without drafts or dry air.
- **No dust:** Since no dust is circulated throughout the air, this is the perfect system for anyone with seasonal allergies.

## **HOME COOKING**

#### **Seven Layer Taco Dip**

It's game time, and when setting the table for a party, you'll want food that is equally delicious as it is easy to eat. And what's easier than chips and dip?

Prep Time 10 mins Cook Time 20 mins **Total Time** 30 mins

Servings 30

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1 package (1 ounce) taco seasoning mix
- 1 can (16 ounces) refried beans
- 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened
- 1 container (16 ounces) sour cream
- 1 jar (16 ounces) salsa
- 1 large tomato, chopped
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 bunch chopped green onions
- 1 small head iceberg lettuce, shredded

- 1 can (6 ounces) sliced black olives, drained
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Blend the taco seasoning and refried beans in a medium bowl until completely smooth.
- 2. Spread this mixture evenly in the bottom of your serving dish.
- 3. Mix together the sour cream and cream cheese in a separate medium-sized bowl.
- 4. Carefully spread this cheese

mixture over the beans in the serving bowl, covering the layer.

- Spoon the salsa over the top of the cream cheese and sour cream, gently spreading it over to reach the edges.
- 6. Toss together the chopped tomatoes, green pepper, green onions and shredded lettuce, and sprinkle over the salsa.
- 7. Top this with the shredded cheese and garnish with black olives.
