PROJECT TUNDRA SELECTED FOR U.S. DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY FUNDING

Project Tundra reached major milestones in the fourth quarter of 2023 that help position the project for a final decision in the upcoming year.

The U.S. Department of Energy announced on Dec. 14 that it has selected Project Tundra as a recipient of funding through the Carbon Capture Demonstration Projects Program. The funding award is under negotiation for up to \$350 million.

"We're grateful that the Department of Energy recognizes the importance of developing carbon capture systems and is positioning the United States to be a leader in the advancement of this critical clean energy technology," said Mac McLennan, Minnkota president and CEO. "Innovation is our path forward through the energy transition. Project Tundra has the potential to help pave the way toward a future where electric grid reliability and environmental stewardship go hand in hand." a permit on Oct. 4 that will provide additional space to safely and permanently store carbon dioxide (CO_2) near Center, N.D. The Dakota Carbon Center West storage facility has the capacity to store 122 million metric tons of CO_2 over a 20year period. Combined with the already permitted Dakota Carbon Center East facility, Project Tundra has the capability to store 222 million metric tons of CO_2 over two decades in Oliver County.

The vision for Project Tundra is to advance next generation carbon capture and storage technologies at the Milton R. Young Station, a power generation facility located near Center, N.D. The project is being developed by Minnkota Power Cooperative, TC Energy, Mitsubishi Heavy Industries and Kiewit and its affiliates.

Through Project Tundra, up to 4 million metric tons of CO_2 are planned to be captured annually from the Young Station and stored in geologic formations

approximately one mile underground near the plant site. If Project Tundra moves forward into construction, it will be the largest post-combustion CO_2 capture project in the world.

"We remain grateful for the strong support we've received from area landowners, city the of Center and Oliver County," McLennan said. "The science has shown that we have ideal geology to store CO_2 in the region, but none of that matters if we don't build and maintain relationships with the people in the area. We look forward to continued engagement with these stakeholders as Project Tundra moves ahead."

Project Tundra is currently in its final development phase. The completion of advanced engineering and design work on the carbon capture facility is scheduled for the spring of 2024. A final decision on whether to move forward with the project is expected in mid-2024.

NOTICE TO COGENERATORS

In compliance with Minnesota Adopted Rules Relating to Cogeneration and Small Power Production, chapter 7835, North Star Electric Cooperative is required to interconnect with and purchase electricity from cogenerators and small power producers that satisfy the conditions of a Qualifying Facility. North Star has available and will provide free information to all interested members regarding rates and interconnection requirements. An application for interconnection is required for a Qualifying Facility to interconnect and operate in parallel with the cooperative's distribution system and is subject to approval by the cooperative. STATE LAW FOR ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY

State law offers active military personnel additional payment options for their electric bills. The law covers disconnection, payment arrangements, appeal and annual notice to cooperative members. Similar to the state's Cold Weather Rule, an application must be completed and income guidelines exist. It's available for active duty military personnel, deployed or completing a permanent duty station change.



Winter impacts on generation resources

Winter has a way of slowing us down. We have to set aside time to shovel the driveway, drive slowly on icy roads and bundle up the kids with extra warm layers. It's no different for electric generation resources. They all have an Achilles heel in the winter – some more detrimental than others (251-35-006-01, Jim Ney Jr). Minnkota Power Cooperative (North Star Electric Cooperative's power supplier) uses a diverse mix of several resources to ensure a reliable power supply during the coldest, darkest months.

Coal*

Winter impacts:

 In extreme cases, blizzardlike conditions may halt coal extraction and delivery to the power plant.

The good news:

• Many northern coal-fired power plants like Minnkota's Milton R. Young Station are mine-mouth, which means transportation to the plant is minimal (and a couple of weeks of coal is stored directly onsite in case of interruption). These plants are also fully winterized and prepared for subzero temperatures.



Winter impacts:

- Gas supplies may be diverted to home and business heating during extended cold snaps.
- Natural gas generators, wellheads and pipelines face operating challenges during extreme cold.

The good news:

 Natural gas is often stored in underground reservoirs, which are less susceptible to extreme cold.

Winter impacts:

Hydro*

- Rivers and reservoirs can quickly ice up, and that ice buildup can slow water intake and affect turbine performance.
- In rare occasions, extreme cold may lead to reduced water flow due to frozen or reduced precipitation.

The good news:

 Hydropower is generally less affected by extreme cold compared to other forms of energy generation, as long as water flow is maintained.

Solar

Winter impacts:

- Shorter winter days mean fewer hours of sun hitting the solar panels.
- Snow and ice can accumulate on the solar panels, reducing overall generation.

The good news:

• Solar panels can still generate some power in freezing temperatures, but efficiency decreases significantly.

Wind*

Winter impacts:

- Wind turbines can go into shutdown mode when temps drop below -20 degrees.
- Blade icing can decrease a turbine's ability to catch wind efficiently.

The good news:

• Cold weather packages can be added to wind turbines, but they add cost and lower efficiency.

Nuclear

Winter impacts:

 Nuclear plants often use rivers or lakes for cooling purposes, and those water intake and discharge systems may freeze up if not weatherized.

The good news:

 Cold weather can enhance the efficiency of nuclear cooling systems by providing a cooler environment for heat exchange during fission.

STAFF REPORT – NO RATE INCREASE PLANNED IN 2024



As we finish up our 2023 financial reports, I'm pleased to report that we are ending the year with better-than-budgeted margins. This is despite the fact we sold fewer kWh throughout the year than we had projected. In February, these margins will be allocated to you, our members, based on the amount of electricity you purchased in 2023. We will use them for a time as working capital, and in future years they will be paid back to you when we process capital credit retirements.

Robyn Sonstegard *Manager of Finance & Administration* No rate increase planned for 2024 As you may recall, we had an increase to the monthly fixed charge

Administration in April 2023. Our 2024 budget looks good this year with the same fixed and kWh rates, so we are not planning for any increase in 2024 (252-12-042-52, Tracy

Sorrels). Minnkota's wholesale power pricing will remain the same next year also, which is the biggest factor helping us keep rates stable for our membership.

Sales tax exemption

If electricity is your primary source (meaning 50% or more) of residential heat, the off-peak portion of your bill is tax exempt from November through April. Most likely, we have a sales tax exemption form on file for you, so you don't need to send us one. But if you don't recall ever giving us a sales tax exemption form, please let us know so we can check our files.
